## A LETTER TO OUR VETERANS from a Veteran

My name is Juli Potter. I am a veterinarian, a mother, a student, and an Army veteran. My family has been part of the Ride With Pride community for over seven years, and I would like to invite you, as a member of our local community, and as a veteran, to join us at Ride with Pride. I would like to tell you about my experience as a member of the Ride With Pride community, and the Ride With Pride Veterans Program.

The connections we have made at Ride With Pride, and with the horses, have had a significant impact on our lives. I have always dreamed of working with horses, and RWP has given me that opportunity. As a student at RWP, I have gained confidence, body awareness, and the ability to respond to the needs of my equine partner, as a rider and as a caregiver. My goal as a student is to be able to understand my equine partner, to listen to him, and to be able to communicate effectively in the most gentle way; I believe that horses have a right to autonomy. To do this, I must focus on the body language of my equine partner, on the ground and when riding. I must remain calm, quiet my body, and try to connect with my partner. This has required me to overcome many of my fears, to learn to relax, to understand how my own tension and body position affects my horse, and to respond to what my horse is telling me.

My equine partner is Scotty. He is the most beautiful Palomino quarter horse; he is a retired fox hunter, and he is well trained. Scotty is an amazing teacher. I have learned that if I tense up, Scotty will start to trot, and if I lean forward or my legs move back, Scotty will start to trot. If I rely too much on the reins, Scotty will resist, and if he gets frustrated, he will either trot, which is a choppy gait when he is frustrated, or he might just stop and refuse to move! I have also noticed that if I relax, take a deep breath and calm my body,

and relax my grip on the reins, Scotty will slow down, and he seems to relax as well. Scotty responds best to, and prefers, the slightest touch, so to ask him to turn, I have to let go of the tension I am feeling and apply only slight pressure on the rein, and when I want to stop, I have to prepare myself by taking a deep breath, sitting in my saddle, and avoid putting too much pressure on the reins. When I am riding, my focus is on Scotty, and away from everything else that is going on in my life; and during that time, there is no other place I would rather be.

The Ride With Pride community includes the director, Carolyn, the instructors, and the volunteers. Carolyn is amazing, she is a wonderful listener, she truly cares about the students and the volunteers, and she always wants what is best for the horses. Carolyn is innovative, compassionate, knowledgeable, and works hard to make dreams come true. The instructors at Ride With Pride focus on the needs of the students as well as the needs of our equine partners. Kelsey, who has been my

instructor, as well as my son's, is beyond compare; her devotion to myself and my son, and to all the students, speaks volumes to her character. Kelsey has challenged me to step out of my comfort zone, and to always try harder; she is the first to tell me to do it better the next time, and the first to celebrate my successes! This program thrives on the most amazing volunteers. They devote so much of their time to the students and the horses; it has been a pleasure spending time with such caring, devoted individuals.

Working with Scotty and spending time at RWP has been one of the best experiences of my life, and I want to extend an invitation to you to join me in learning how much you can benefit from this program. You will find so much joy in being part of the Ride With Pride community and in having the opportunity to spend time with and learn from these amazing equine partners.

I do hope you will contact us; we would love for you to meet the horses, and we look forward to the opportunity to tell you more about the programs we offer at Ride With Pride!

The Ride With Pride Veterans Program is free to all veterans. This program provides a supportive environment for veterans and their families to connect with an equine partner, to build caring, trusting relationships with the horse and with the Ride With Pride community. Through your work with Ride With Pride, you can gain communication skills, strength, self-awareness, self-regulation, and awareness for the needs of others, including your equine partner.

### "MY BLIND KNABSTRUPPER" - FREJ'S STORY

Sophia Bryant is a Ride With Pride board member and owner of the incredible blind Knabstrupper, Frej, who has joined the RWP herd this year, to the delight of our students, staff, and supporters. Frej and Sophia have had an incredible journey together, one that resonates with every horse owner, and one that speaks of the amazing bond between horses and humans. We are so grateful to have Sophia and Frej as part of our program. The story Sophia tells is a beautiful one that may bring tears to your eyes. This story is quite long and detailed and because of the love that is conveyed in its telling, we did not want to edit it down to fit on these pages. Therefore, we have included a short excerpt here:

Many times I have been asked to write about Frej and our story. While it sounds like a good idea, I have always been fearful I will fall short in conveying how truly incredible and amazing this horse is. So here is my best shot at putting everything down on paper.

I unfortunately cannot remember the exact day I met Frej (pronounced "Fray"), but I know it was in 2013. At the time I was working as a stable hand at Cedar Creek Stables, owned by Dr. Melyni Worth, which is both a private boarding facility but also Dr. Worth's personal breeding farm for a rare breed of horse, known as a Knabstrupper. The Knabstrupper breed is valued for their exceptional temperament and trainability, their friendly nature on top of their beautiful and colorful coat patterns. In the early 2000's Dr. Worth imported several Knabstruppers from Denmark and Germany, to start up her breeding program here in the US. Frej happened to be one of the first that came over from Denmark. Frej was a gangly 3-year-old when he crossed the pond. I don't know a lot about his early years, but he eventually went on to be sold as a Jumper. I was told he even dabbled in the Level 3 and 4's! One thing Frej loved to do (even up to the time he went blind) was jump.

Fast forward a few years. As I said Frej was sold into the Jumper world when he was younger, and one might wonder just how he ended up back at Cedar Creek years later. Unfortunately, the story I have been told as to how he made it back home was not a happy one. Supposedly, Frej ended up in the hands of someone who in my opinion did not deserve him. This horse is by far one of the goofiest and kindest horses I've ever met. He loves people and is incredibly kind and gentle. He is literally The Gentle Giant in horse form. So, when Dr. Worth got a call from his current owner saying Frej was going to be put down unless Melyni agreed to take him back, came as a shock. Allegedly the reason being was that Frej was "dangerous and nasty". A little side note about Melyni. When she sells any of her horses, especially her Knabbies she always makes it known that the horses can come back to her if they need to retire. She doesn't want to see them end up in kill pens and for this reason she adds this to her sales agreements. Thus, this is how and why Frej ended up back home at Cedar Creek...
